In today's Gospel reading Jesus promised to send the Holy Spirit to the disciples after He was gone. The Holy Spirit would teach them all they needed to know.







Home to the Holy Spirit, our hearts become the eternal dwelling place of Christ.

Christians on pilgrimage to the Holy Land are often greeted with the words, "Welcome home." Indeed, the Church began in Jerusalem; Jesus died right outside of its walls; and it is also home to the first council recounted in today's first reading. Truly, our home is not in a particular place but in Christ, through the gift of the Holy Spirit. Jesus gives light to the new Jerusalem, which is the eternal city, the kingdom of God.

In the first reading, the Apostles send a letter to Antioch explaining which practices [with regard to the Mosaic law] are necessary for Gentiles who have come to believe in the Gospel. In the second reading, John describes his vision of the new Jerusalem, which shines with Christ's eternal light. Jesus, in the Gospel, foretells the coming of the Advocate. The Holy Spirit, Jesus tells his disciples, will teach you everything and remind you of all that I told you.

Building Update: The council met last week and voted to accept a bid from Krause Konstruction to tuck point the entire building. The cost for this will be \$48,680. If we do not do this, we will have major issues in the future. We need to keep the building up to code and looking good. It was also decided to move ahead with our basement renovation that is part of our Inspired by the Spirit Campaign. This project will cost \$25,740 to replace the floor with Legacy Concrete Coatings. We also plan to paint the walls. Help will be needed to move EVERYTHING from the basement before this project starts. We will need help from all parishioners for this!!! If anybody is willing to donate towards these projects, we would greatly appreciate it so that we don't deplete a large portion of our maintenance budget. Please place donations in a marked envelope & place in the offertory.
