## **Stewardship Reflection**

## **First Sunday in Advent**

Today, we embark on the profound journey of Advent - a season of profound significance. It is a time of preparation, not just for the celebration of the birth of our Savior, but also for the anticipation of His second

These are weighty tasks with eternal consequences. So, let us as Christian stewards make the words of the Prophet Isaiah our motto for the season: "Come, let us climb the Lord's mountain to the house of the God of Jacob, that he may instruct us in his ways and we may walk in his paths."

As we approach Christmas, the world seems to demand more from us. It urges us to spend more, do more, and be more, all in the pursuit of a 'perfect' Christmas. However, the Church's wisdom calls us to a different path, one that leads us to focus on our spiritual lives. This shift in focus can indeed feel like a challenging mountain climb, but it is a climb worth taking.
But the intentional and wise use of the gift of time is precisely what the Christian steward is called to do, and

with even greater intensity during Advent.

How can we use our time to prepare for a holy celebration of Jesus' birth on Dec. 25 and for his second coming at a date we do not know? Here are some practical tips: set aside time for personal prayer and reflection, attend additional church services, participate in Advent themed Bible studies, and engage in acts of charity and kindness.

We can push back against the world's pressure to have the "perfect Christmas." Scale back on the material kind of gift-giving, the complicated menus, the unessential trappings of the season, so that we have more time for the spiritual preparations: Confession, weekday Mass, adoration, family prayer time, lighting the Advent wreath, acts of kindness.

While the journey may feel like a mountain climb, the rewards are immeasurable. At the end of this spiritual preparation, we will be ready to celebrate a truly meaningful Christmas. We will have grown closer to our Savior and be prepared for His second coming. Let's embrace this climb up the Lord's mountain!

This is a Holy Day of Obligation.

We will have a mass here for him on Saturday December 13th at 11:00 AM. The choir will sing several of his favorite songs. A potluck is planned afterwards in the basement. All are welcome.

Advent begins Nov. 30th: Advent is the season of preparation for the birth of Christ that includes a call to purification through personal spiritual renewal, receiving the sacrament of reconciliation (confession), and making simple acts of penance and sacrifice. Purification is a key theme, involving the cleansing of hearts and minds from worldly distractions to focus on Christ's coming, asking for the grace to "purify hope" and preparing for the Lord. The priest's vestments during Advent are purple, the color of penance and sacrifice. They are a constant reminder of our need to get ready—to be cleansed and purified. Advent is a season for stepping back from our busy lives, taking time in stillness and solitude, to reflect more deeply on the mystery of God's Incarnation—Jesus taking on human flesh to be among us. This can also include something like not having dessert occasionally, or turning off the TV for one night or setting aside an electronic device for an hour. Or this can include helping someone in need or visiting a person who is lonely. We offer small sacrifices to spend this Advent in true preparation for the real gift of Christmas—Jesus Christ.
