
Saint John the Baptist prepared the way for Jesus by calling people to repentance. You can help prepare for

# Stewardship Reflection

Third Sunday in Advent

Good news, Christian stewards — we are making progress in our Advent journey, and it's time to pause and rejoice in the Good News that our Savior will return in victory one day. Today's readings on this Gaudete ("Rejoice") Sunday are full of reminders of God's ultimate victory over suffering and injustice, and they encouragement to remain steadfast in our mission to living as faith-filled disciples.

Such a day almost seems too good to be true, especially when we look around at the dire circumstances we face in our world today. But by faith, we know this day is coming. Lest we grow weary as we wait for the glorious day of Christ's return, St. James, in our second reading, offers wise counsel. "Be patient, brothers and sisters, until the coming of the Lord." "Make your hearts firm... Do not complain, brothers and sisters, about one another, that you may not be judged."

This is excellent advice for us, Christian stewards, as we face the challenges of daily life in our broken world, especially during the hectic days before Christmas when stress can cause us and those around us to be less than our best. St. James reminds us that we have the power to choose our response to both the major strains and minor annoyances of life. In other words, we can be good stewards of our attitude by "making our hearts firm" through practicing patience with others and refusing the temptation to complain.

Remember, we have the choice to see and rejoice in God's presence with us, regardless of the circumstances we face. This is a source of hope and optimism that can guide us through the challenges of our daily lives.
